LEADING IN AN ERA OF HEALTH 2.0  
SUBMITTED BY SHANDRA PROTZKO**

The World Wide Web has had a dramatic impact on the health care consumer and the health care professional. The web is evolving from a passive dissemination platform to a more interactive, collaborative, and user-driven platform. This evolution is precipitating the creation of Health 2.0. I am pleased to present Dr. Diane Skiba as our speaker for the annual meeting in April. Her presentation will provide an introduction to the concept of Health 2.0 and the associated Web 2.0 tools available. You will also be able to examine how this evolution will impact not only the future of care delivery but how to negotiate a future workforce with multiple generations of professionals, including the net generation.

Dr. Diane J. Skiba is Professor and Coordinator of Healthcare Informatics at the University of Colorado Denver. She serves as Project Director of I-Collaboratory: Partnerships in Learning project, a Health Resources and Service Administration (HRSA) Advanced Nurse Education grant. She is also the Co-Project Director of the Health Information Technology Scholars (HITS) Project, a faculty development project funded by the Division of Nursing at HRSA. Her research interests focus on online communities, social presence, and best practices in web-based learning. Dr. Skiba is an honorary fellow of the American Academy of Nursing and an honorary member of Sigma Theta Tau. She is an elected fellow of the American College of Medical Informatics. She was the Co-Chair of the Tiger Initiative (2005-2006). She is a member of the National Advisory Council on Nursing Education and Practice that advises the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the U.S. Congress on policy issues related to the Title VIII programs administered by the HRSA Bureau of Health Professions Division of Nursing. She is a frequent speaker nationally and internationally and has published extensively.

## **LYNNE FOX HONORED WITH 2009 MARLA GRABER AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE AND ACHIEVEMENT**

On behalf of the Marla Graber Award Committee and the CCML Executive Committee, we are delighted to announce this year's recipient of the Marla Graber Award for Excellence and Achievement – Lynne Fox.

Lynne has been an Assistant Professor at the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center Library since 1997, with a Joint Appointment to the School of Medicine Center for Computational Pharmacology since 2004. She started her library career at the Cornell University Undergraduate Library (1981-83), followed by library positions at the University of Michigan (1983-1984), Armstrong State College in Savannah, GA (1984-1986), and the University of Northern Colorado (1986-1993). She received her B.A. (Cum Laude) in History and Fine Art History from the University of Colorado in 1981, her A.M.L.S. from the University of Michigan in 1984, and an M.A. in History from the University of Northern Colorado in 1996.

Lynne joined CCML in 1994 and continues to serve CCML in many capacities. Most notable is the work she has done on CCML's behalf for Colleague Connection. Lynne created a procedure manual for Colleague Connection that facilitated planning for anyone following her as organizational coordinator. She continues to assist library groups and mentor CCML members involved in planning the event.

Lynne is currently Chair of the MCMLA 2009 Annual Meeting Planning Committee, a task that only someone with Lynne's energy, vision, and organizational skills could undertake. She has served CCML in many other roles, including her tenure as President (2004-2005), President-Elect (2003-2004), Secretary (2001-2002), Bylaws Committee Chair (2005-2006, 2008-2009), Nominating Committee (2005-2006, 2007-2008), *Council Quotes* Editor (1999-2002), Website Editor (1997-2003), Internet Committee Chair (1997-2003), Web Page Task Force Chair (1996-1997), Library Cooperation Committee (1996-1997), and Annual Tele-video Meeting Planner (2001-2002).

Lynne plays an active and animated role in CCML meetings and activities. Her enthusiasm is contagious. And anyone who has served on a committee with Lynne can attest to her remarkable ability to simply get things done. Lynne has always been on the cutting edge of technology and has introduced many in the CCML community to the latest tech trends.

In addition to her role as Chair of the 2009 MCMLA Planning Committee, she was Chair of the 2000 MCMLA Registration Committee and member of the 2000 MCMLA CE and Program Committees. She served on the MCMLA Publications Committee (1997-2004), the Archives Committee (2004+), was MCMLA Website Editor (1997-2003), and MCMLA Region Liaison for AHIP (2004-2007).

Lynne was Incorporator and President of the Board of Directors of the Colorado Library Educational Foundation (1988-1996). For the Colorado Library Association, she served as Chair of the College and University Division (1991-1992), Chair of the Junior Members Roundtable (1987-1988), and member of the Grants and Special Projects Committee (1987-1995). She first held office as Vice President/President Elect of the Coastal Georgia Library Association (1986).

Lynne teaches within the community of librarians both locally and nationally, happily sharing her knowledge and expert organizational skills. She mentors new librarians and ably represents CCML and health sciences librarians in all aspects of her professional service, including health fairs and CU-wide events. The list of courses she has taught and her papers, posters, presentations, and podcasts runs to some 6 pages (and counting). And the list of courses she has attended stands at 9 pages.

Lynne also publishes and encourages other librarians to publish professionally. She co-edits and writes for the MLA News Technology Column and through that work has promoted the work of local and regional librarians and library staff. The publications section of her CV totals 7 pages so far. And she has had 10 funded research projects.

The Marla Graber Award is but the most recent in a long list of honors that Lynne has received, including her membership in the Academy of Health Information Professionals at the Distinguished level, various university and publishing honors, a faculty achievement award at the University of Northern Colorado, and a stint as a contestant on “Jeopardy!”

Clearly, Lynne can be counted on to volunteer “early and often” in serving her profession. This is also true for her service organizations. A believer in putting your time where your beliefs are, Lynne works hard to make a difference in the organizations she joins. She cares deeply about the library profession and our work, and strives to exemplify the best in librarianship in her work, both paid and volunteer.

At this year’s Colleague Connection, Lynne disclosed her desire to run for public office. The library world would be well-served to have someone of Lynne’s keen intellect, boundless energy, and leadership abilities as our representative in the political sphere. Lynne, you have our vote! cq

## MUSINGS BY MAXWELL SUBMITTED BY DICK MAXWELL

A staple of local TV news seems to be the blood-curdling report detailing the latest scam being perpetrated on innocent citizens. Someone who for inexplicable reasons is willing to admit this kind of thing on camera will be interviewed and report something like: “He seemed like a very nice young man, and his dear mother needed a uvula transplant right away. He said the hospital insisted on cash, and since it was Sunday, he had no way of cashing a check until the next day, and he wasn’t sure his mother could make it until then. I had \$3000 in the freezer and I took his IOU since right then he noticed he’d lost his checkbook...and he gave me the only picture of his mother that he had in his wallet...he said it would prove to me that he’d be back to make things right. Well...you know...that was a month and a half ago and I’m afraid something might have happened to him.” Or something like that. Local reporters (the “Call for Action” man or woman or some similarly labeled consumer pit bull) love those stories, and they seem to be convinced that we’re all...the kindest way to put it would be “very gullible.”

In the world of medicine the scam is an honored tradition that’s been around since we first stood upright (“Ow!” “Give meat!” “Here meat!” “Drink!” “Glug” “You better. Me go.” “Ow!”). Providing some protection today for those who choose to pay attention is the invaluable *quackwatch.com* maintained by Stephen Barrett, MD. You have to admire Barrett and the others he works with for consistently being able to work their way past the disbelieving dropped-jaw stage when they hear about the things that our...hyper-open-mindedness...that’s nice...leads us to pay for and to put on or in our bodies. They soldier on, report the dry and colorless facts, and keep straight faces, at least in HTML.

Take for example, an ad that ran on several radio stations within the last few years, promising perfect vision brought to you by the use of some special eye exercises. That would be swell. As always, we are to suspect that a conspiracy has kept this amazing technique from us. The ophthalmology/optometry/optician/designer frame cabal has everything to lose if the word gets out. As it turns out, the height of activity for this particular breakthrough was in about 1920, when William Horatio Bates, MD, published *The Cure of Imperfect Eyesight by Treatment without Glasses*. Name your eye condition or ailment, and Bates would claim that his set of exercises could cure it, from nearsightedness to macular degeneration. Despite periodic interventions and pooh-poohing by such old fogies as the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), and no actual indication that it works, variations of this still exist today. In trying to explain what a waste of time and money this would be, Barrett and his co-authors roll out the phrase that they feel compelled to use frequently but, I have to assume, without much real hope: “It *should be fairly obvious* that...”

A sterling example of scamming persistence was Jacob William Kulp, known to radio listeners 25 or so years ago as “Dr. Jack,” chiropractor, nutrition expert, and promoter of holistic health. Dr. Jack sold nutritional products to cure such things as “black intestinal plaque,” and the FTC found that they generally didn’t rise to the level promised. This seems a bit unfair. Since there is no black intestinal plaque, his wheat germ tablets could hardly be expected to cure it. Bureaucrats. While awaiting sentencing for that particular misdeed, Dr. Jack went right back on the radio pushing bee pollen and royal jelly as cures for impotence, and a product called Banfi that he offered as a cure for baldness. Still, you never know, so you might want to consider his advice about a favorite warm weather treat: “...ice cream has formaldehyde in it, it has lacquer thinners in it, it has, my God, if I told you some of the constituents, gum tars, you wouldn’t believe what’s in ice cream!” Who knew that the ingredients could be found at Home Depot?

One of the most fascinating ongoing stories involves Dr. Hulda Clark, author of *The Cure for All Cancers* and provider of the Syncrometer, the Super-Zapper Deluxe, and the Complete Herbal Parasite Program. She’s still at it despite legal troubles in several states and, impressively, in Tijuana, Mexico. **MEDNAR: A FEDERATED MEDICAL SEARCH ENGINE**

Mednar bills itself as a medical federated search engine. It returns results from across the "World Wide Web, including blogs, wikis, mainstream searches, and deep web sources to one, easily navigable page. Each search is done in real-time, searching the sources you select as if you were entering the search term on each individual website yourself. Duplicates are removed, the results weighed for relevance, and then ranked according to how closely it matches your search word or phrase. Clicking on any of the results will take you directly to the source website where you can view your information directly." The data collection phase of the 2007 interlibrary loan survey began in April, 2008. Libraries were instructed in how to download DOCLINE data. Data were sent to Jim Honour, who was to reprise his data entry/compilation role from the previous (2002) survey. Jim's new position at the University of Wyoming forced him to resign from the committee in June. The data compilation role was assumed by Sean Crow in May, 2008.

The committee decided to recruit a paraprofessional to fill Jim's position and offer the paraprofessional perspective, especially since ILL is often the province of the library tech. Jenny Stevens volunteered to join the committee in June, 2008. After the Feb, 2009 CCML Membership Meeting, Teresa Mullins also volunteered for the committee.

After Sean's work with the raw data was finished, Roz further refined the compilation into spreadsheets that are formatted to match the data from previous surveys. She also investigated adding OCLC data and determined that it was possible. The entire expanded committee, as well as Sean Crow, met on March 6, 2009. Roz provided the spreadsheets. We discussed various ways of looking at the data, speculated on reasons for ILL trends, and assigned sections of a report to be submitted to CCML. Following the meeting, Roz did further tweaking and added OCLC data. The committee plans to meet again on March 30.

Section 4. Internet Committee

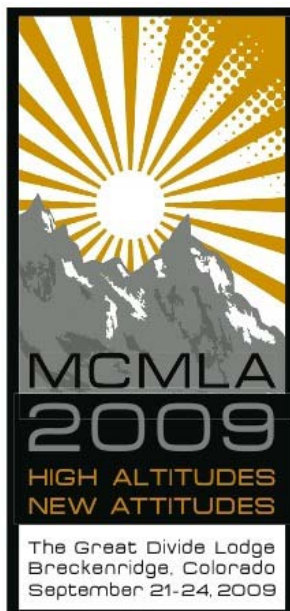
